### Introduction

The European Media and Communication Doctoral Summer School (aka ECREA Summer School) brings together members of the European research community to explore contemporary issues within media and communication studies. The Summer School offers a supportive international setting for European doctoral students, where they can present and develop their ongoing PhD projects and build valuable networks.

The 2023 edition took place 7-13 August at the Department of Communication and Arts, Roskilde University, Denmark. The following reports on the evaluation and financial accounting of the Summer School.

### Organization and programme

The local organizing committee consisted of Jannie Møller Hartley, Sine N. Just, Kim Christian Schrøder, and Ib T. Gulbrandsen. In addition, all major decisions, e.g., selection of applicants, budgeting, and programming, were discussed with and approved by the following ECREA representatives: Andra Siibak, Simone Tosoni, and Pille Pruulmann Vengerfeldt.

The Summer School ran over seven full working days and included feedback sessions, methodological workshops, talks and round tables, as well as social activities and cultural excursions. ### Attendees

A total of 102 students applied for a spot, which was the highest number of applicants in the history of the Summer School. Of those, 50 students were admitted following a review process that involved YECREA (the young scholars association under ECREA), the above mentioned ECREA representatives, and the local organizing committee. A total of 37 applied for the announced 17 ECREA grants (which covers participation fee). The YECREA management team, Sandra Banjac, Antonio Cuartero, and Phoebe Maares, reviewed and selected which applicants were offered a grant. Due to personal circumstances, three students had to drop out last minute. Two of these asked for the opportunity to participate in their respective feedback sessions online and were given this option. Hence, a total of 47 students attended on site, representing more than 40 different universities across Europe, as well as Chile, China, India, and Türkiye.



#### Lecturers

A total of 21 lecturers participated in the Summer School, giving feedback, talks, and/or workshops. The visiting lecturers were Anne Kaun, Cathrin Bengesser, David Selva Ruiz, Delia Dumitricia, Fredrik Stiernstedt, Jairo Faria Guedes Coelho, John Downey, Julie Uldam, Maria Schreiber, Pille Pruulmann Vengerfeldt, Roman Horbyk, and Tina Askanius. Lecturers from the Department of Communication and Arts, Roskilde University, were Andreas Birkbak, David Mathieu, Ib T. Gulbrandsen, Jannie Møller Hartley, Kim C. Schrøder, Louise Yung Nielsen, Mark Ørsten, Rasmus Rex Pedersen, Sine N. Just, and Tobias Raun.

### **Evaluation**

To evaluate how the attendees experienced the Summer School, we employed the Delphi method. On the final day, all students were asked to fill out a form (see appendix 2) where they detailed things that were great and things that could be improved for the next summer school, then discussed their comments and suggestions in their respective tracks, and finally presented what they as a group found to be the most important feedback during a plenary session, where the local organizing committee and several lecturers were present. The following highlights what was presented and discussed during the plenary session, as well as individual feedback provided by the students on the above mentioned forms (the forms were collected at the end of the plenary session and can be provided upon request).

### Things that were great

- The atmosphere: during the plenary discussion it was highlighted again and again that the participants had experienced the summer school as a very supportive, productive, and enjoyable milieu. That they felt seen, engaged, and appreciated; that they got help when needed and challenged when due; and that we managed to quickly establish a setting where we could have serious discussions and fun at the same time. At the end of the discussion several students expressed that this was the first time they had felt at home in the academic world.
- The organization: All 47 students noted on their individual forms that they found the organization of the Summer School to be excellent from programme content and administrative support to location and activities. Examples provided by the students include excellent timekeeping, clear communication, the staff's helpfulness, as well as food, drinks, and accommodation. We experienced no significant 'hiccups' during the summer school, and the students recognized this as a major achievement, praising the department and organizing committee for their efforts.
- The feedback sessions and track leaders: Similar to the organization, all 47 students singled out the feedback sessions as an absolute highpoint of the Summer School. This was further repeated and expanded upon during the plenary discussion, where they stressed how productive they found the sessions to be. Not only did the sessions provide in-depth, concrete feedback on and support for their own work, but also ample opportunity to discuss larger themes and challenges across the individual projects. The students, in unison, credited the track leaders for achieving this during the plenary session the track leaders were repeatedly applauded and praised for their subject-knowledge and level of engagement with all individual projects/participants.

### Things that could be improved

• <u>Workshop duration</u>: All students were very pleased with the assortment of workshops – both content and lecturers were praised – but many expressed that they found the workshops to be too short. That the allotted 90 minutes where not enough; that they wished there had been more time to go in-depth with the themes presented.

- <u>Breaks and free time</u>: Though all students praised the organization of the Summer School, they suggested that breaks be made shorter for the next Summer School. They also noted that they had wished there was a bit more free time to allow exploring Roskilde city and Copenhagen.
- Assignment of tracks: Some students found that the assignment of tracks lacked transparency. Whilst emphasising that they had enjoyed their track, a few noted that they would have preferred to have been placed in a different one. During the plenary discussion solutions to this were deliberated and a concrete suggestion raised was the possibility of the students to choose between certain key words when they applied, key words that would then form the basis for the track assignment.
- Talks: All talks were praised and deemed interesting, but several students commented that the topics covered at times were less relevant for them. Other students suggested that future Summer School talks should focus more on 1) methodological traditions and trends in media and communication research rather than empirical/theoretical discussions, and/or 2) career and professional development (e.g., how to advance in academia; how to handle supervisor-challenges).
- <u>Food</u>: Most students praised the quality and variation of food, drinks, and snacks. Several noted that they preferred a hot lunch over sandwiches. A small number of students asked that future editions of the Summer School aim to make the vegetarian/vegan meal options more varied.
- <u>Transportation</u>: A few students pointed out that they found the transportation from the hotel to campus expensive, in particular because it came on top of already high prices on other things they needed whilst in Denmark for the Summer School.

Please see concluding remarks for how we plan on accommodating the feedback on things that could be improved.

### **Financial accounting**

The Summer School was predominantly financed through participation fees. For the 2023 edition the fees were 990 euros for ECREA members and 1150 euros for non-members. The participation fee covered:

- Accommodation in single rooms (6-13 August)
- Breakfast, lunch, coffee breaks, snacks and drinks (7-13 August)
- Welcome reception, excursion to Copenhagen, and farewell dinner
- Summer school materials, including diploma, nametags, tote bag etc.

In addition to the participation fee, the Doctoral School of Communication and Arts and the SCAI-project contributed 4355 euro, on top of ECREA's 2000 euro contribution as well as a 1000 euro from the University of Bergen (to cover the costs related to the excursion to Copenhagen).

The final balance is a surplus of 1578,59 euro, which will be saved and used towards the 2024 edition of the Summer School. See below for final accounts.

### **Concluding remarks**

All in all, the local organizing committee deems the 2023 Summer School a success. This is in large part thanks to the backing of the Department and Doctoral School of Communication and Arts, the hard labor of Marianne, Rie, and Jolita, in addition to great support from ECREA.

Based on the above-mentioned evaluation, the following will be adjusted for the 2024 edition of the Summer School:

- <u>Workshop duration</u>: Workshops will have a duration of up to 120 minutes, with the option of some workshops taking place over two days (2x120 minutes).
- <u>Breaks and free time</u>: The lunch break with be shortened 30 minutes, and the afternoon coffee break will be shortened 15 minutes.
- Assignment of tracks: We will ask the ECREA administration if it is possible to incorporate set key words,
  which the applicants can choose from when applying. These key words will then form the basis for the
  track assignment.
- <u>Talks</u>: We focus the talks for the 2024 edition of the Summer School on methodological traditions and trends in media and communication research, and plan for more activities focused on career and professional development.
- <u>Food</u>: We will serve more hot lunches and ensure that the vegetarian/vegan meal options are more varied.
- <u>Transportation</u>: For the 2024 edition we aim to include a 'travel card' to public transportation as part of what is covered by the participation fee. Due to price changes in the Danish public transportation network, a final decision on this will have to wait until spring 2024.
